## Integrity Through My Eyes

I believe that having integrity is necessary to success because it helps develop trust.

Integrity guides one to decipher right from wrong, and integrity is a large component in decision making. As a student, integrity is something I value and recognize in myself, my peers, and my educators. Becker defined integrity as "the principle of being principled, practicing what one preaches regardless of emotional or social pressure, and not allowing any irrational consideration to overwhelm one's rational convictions" (157). Integrity shapes character, affects how I choose to spend my time, and helps discipline me in my education.

Integrity guides actions, which in turn, reflects character. One of the best examples of this is the Golden Rule. How I decide to treat others and how I decide to spend my time is something that is important to me because I know what I am involved with demonstrates my character; this demonstrates integrity. "The key factor for developing and maintaining integrity throughout life is a sense of self or identity in which ethical values are central. My personal integrity cannot be changed by anyone but myself, and I will not allow it to be. Integrity defines my character and guides my moral compass. I have become more aware of what it takes to have integrity in my life. My challenge now is to set an example for others around me.
